In the hustle and bustle of modern life, where time often slips through our fingers like grains of sand, the significance of dedicating moments to engage in "meaningful listening" with our children cannot be overstated. This intentional act goes beyond mere conversation; it delves into the essence of understanding, empathy and shared values. # **DID YOU KNOW?**



The 12 sons of Jacob were the first people to say the words **'Shema Yisrael...'**.

Inside every

Mezuza case

which are put on

our door posts,

there is a small

scroll with the first

two paragraphs

of the Shema

written on it.



The Shema contains **three paragraphs**, all found in the Torah.

We cover our eyes with our right hand when we say the first line of the Shema.



The mitzva to wear **Tefillin**, which men do during weekday morning prayers, is found in the Shema. Tefillin contain the **first two paragraphs of the Shema**.

The Shema is one of the **first** prayers we learn as children and one of the **last** prayers people say before they die.



The night before a brit mila, many people have a custom to invite friends and family to say the Shema with the baby.

# THE TWO ELISHAS

# As told by Rebbetzen Naomi Lerer of Central Synagogue, aunt of (little) Elisha Goldstein

Recently, Elisha Goldstein, a soldier in the IDE took to social media to ask if anvone could help him track down a little boy who lives in Ramat Beit Shemesh. At the beginning of the war,

lots of children across Israel sent treats and letters to soldiers who were fighting to encourage them and send them support.

Flisha had been on guard duty and was hunary. He went to the crate that contained all the treats that people had sent to the soldiers and spotted a chocolate bar he wanted He reached in and noticed an envelope attached to it and read the note. But he got a big shock. The note was signed from a little boy who was also called Flisha Goldstein!

He really felt that was not a coincidence but a sign of how closely all the Jewish people are connected. He wanted to contact little Flisha to thank him.



A couple of months later, somebody saw big Elisha's post and called little Flisha's father to tell him about it. Big Elisha arranged to come and meet little Elisha and even gave him a special hat to thank him for the great feeling of support he felt from the letter. Little Elisha's family felt it was a hug from God!

The Shema prayer tells us to love God. One of the best ways to do this is to love other people, because God gets great happiness when we make others happy.

A story is told of a man named Richard Bass who was a famous adventurer. He is best-known for becoming the first person to have ever climbed the tallest mountain on each of the seven continents of the world.

He was once on a flight and struck up a conversation with the stranger in the seat beside him. Bass, a man known for being very lively and chatty, proceeded to share stories of his various adventures, reportedly for the next three hours of the trip! He told the stranger about his climbing of Mount Denali, in Alaska. He shared stories of his dangerous experiences in the Himalayas, his ascent to Mount Kilimanjaro in Africa, his upcoming plan to reclimb Mount Everest and a variety of tales about his treacherous but exciting climbs and journeys.

As the plane was about to land, Richard realised, "I have been talking about myself the whole flight and I haven't asked you anything about yourself, not even your name!"

"Oh, that's okay," responded his quiet companion, "I'm Neil Armstrong." Neil Armstrong was first person to ever walk on the moon.

If only Richard had given Neil a chance to speak too, he would have heard the most amazing stories about space, from someone who had really been there!

What this story, like the Shema, is teaching us, is that listening is even more important than speaking. When we listen, we learn. God has so much to tell us, but we cannot hear if we do not listen. He also wants us to listen to other people, so we can help them. We might also hear some great stories along the way!




Shema is one of the first words we teach to a Jewish child.

1. Cream the sugar and margarine


Add the rest of the ingredients and mix to form a dough


